A. Executive Summary

Vidya Prasarak Mandal (VPM) was founded in the year 1935 by late Dr. V. N. Bedekar, a medical practitioner of Thane. It began with a primary school and today, the VPM has grown into an educational complex serving the needs of over 15,000 students from Thane and its extended suburbs.

Since 2008 - 2009 the VPM has collaborations with California University of Technology, the USA, the University of Skovde Hogskolevagen, Sweden and has established the VPM's London Academy for Education and Research.

The K.G. Joshi College of Arts & N.G. Bedekar College of Commerce is one among the six institutions on the 10.5 acre land with seven large buildings.

It was the first institution of higher learning to be established in Thane City in 1969. Strategically located, the College is close to Thane Railway Station, and it is well connected by bus services.

The College received permanent affiliation, in January 1988 with effect from June 1982. It was awarded B++ by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC) in January 2004. The College got Grade 'A' during the Second Cycle of the NAAC in January 2011. Now it is due for the Third Cycle of Re-accreditation by the NAAC. During the last five years the College has undertaken a number of quality enhancement measures such as:

- The College is progressing under the well thought of Vision statement, "Information to Knowledge and Knowledge to Wisdom." The Mission statement is, "To nurture and foster an innovative academic environment for critical thinking, all-round growth and continuous development of students and staff to make them responsible and sensitized citizens of society." The two statements reflect that the College is not just churning out the graduates, but it has the desire to look at the big picture of higher education.
- The three **Graduate Attributes** formulated during the present report period have given a precise roadmap for progress. The following are the graduate attributes specified by the College.

- There is an extra emphasis on all-round growth of students through curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Extra managerial support to fine arts, performing arts, literary competitions, sports is visible.
- The Career Guidance and Placement Cell organizes many need-based skill enhancing courses. The Cell is one of the most active units of the institution. It serves as an incubation centre.
- Curriculum for all subjects is revised frequently by the University -at least once in three years- on a need-based scale. The teachers of the College are involved in the revision process in various capacities ranging from being a BoS chairman/member to being invited to participate in the related workshops by various University Departments before and after the change in the syllabi. Similarly, even the College takes initiatives in organizing such workshops.
- Strengthening of the teaching-learning through innovative methods such as use of ICT, PowerPoint presentations, field studies, study tours, etc.
- Two computer laboratories, server room with the leased line and Wi-Fi connectivity caters to the ICT components of all the

courses. Timetables are fine-tuned in such a manner that the number of computers to students ratio is 1:1.

- Emphasis on continuing research and education for teaching faculty through minor / major research programmes, encouragement to join Ph.D. programme, providing FIP leave etc.
- Academic performance of the College has been consistently better than the University Results. Number of First classes and ranks in some examinations are matters of pride. There are career guidance and placement facilities.
- Regularly organising national and international seminars to maintain high quality academic culture on the campus.
- Vibrant and socially relevant extension activities of NSS, NCC, etc. are features of student development.
- Substantial enhancement and augmentation of infrastructural facilities, such as vertical expansion of building, developing auditorium, automated security gate with smart card, sports ground, etc.
- Provision of Reference and Research unit in Library with 20 computers with Internet connectivity, subscription to several national and international databases. The fully automated library has over 100,000 books.
- Braille section and computers with screen readers are dedicated to the visually challenged students.
- Development of personality through Film Society, Sports Academy, Talent Academy, Scholars' Academy, *Vyasa Sabha*, Cultural Programs (*Navarang*) gymkhana, separate gymnasiums for teachers and students etc. are in keeping with the spirit of the Vision and Mission statements.
- Presence of a trained Counselor to meet the emotional problems of students, teachers and supporting staff.
- All these are carried out in a most inclusive manner considering the interest of girl students, reservation policy and other rules of the University of Mumbai being the affiliating body.



The college ensures effective implementation of curriculum through a system of 'Lecture Plan' which is prepared by every teacher and submitted to the Head of the Department, who reviews it regularly in the departmental meetings. The Lecture Plans are reviewed by the Principal in meeting with the respective Department. The HoD meetings are regularly conducted by the college; the Principal asks HoDs of different departments about implementation of syllabus and necessary steps for timely completion.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and / or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

The following points indicate the support from university and / or institution

- The University conducts regular workshops related to the syllabus and paper pattern where teachers participate.

The institution has arranged various guest lectures of the professionals from industry covering various disciplines. The academicians and subject experts from university and other colleges are also invited. The research scholars from various fields have interacted with our students and teachers to name a few - e.g. Dr. Leena Thatte, Dr. J.V. Naik, Dr. Sadanand More.

A few members of staff have worked on the Board of Studies and syllabus framing/revising committees of the University of Mumbai. Besides, teachers discuss the syllabus during the informal meetings and convey the feedback to the University.

The Career and Placement Cell obtains feedback and suggestions regarding course content from the employers and conveys it to the University.

Certificate Course in Social Work: Short-Term course designed for undergraduate students to induct and motivate them to social work.

Along with Core subjects, Applied Component Group (ACG), indicating the related allied professional disciplines such as Demography, Journalism, Library Science etc., are also offered at the second and third year levels. The College follows all the rules and regulations of the University of Mumbai. Credit Based Semester System is offered and credit transfer and accumulation facility is available.

The courses are offered in Modular form and as per the syllabus framed by the University.

As per the University circular AC27/2/13, lateral transfer from Self financing courses to B. Com. is allowed.

The self-financing programmes differ from aided programmes in respect of course contents with emphasis on specialization such as Banking, Finance, Management Science, etc.

Fee structure for these courses is higher than the aided courses.

The institution follows the University guidelines regarding admission, teacher qualification, salary etc.

Yes. The Placement Cell of the College conducts various programmes and courses to orient students in developing communication skills and enhancing employability. Conversational English -an Add-on courseapproved by the University is also offered. Please refer 1.2.1 for a detailed list of courses that enhance regional and global employability.

The beneficiaries of such programmes are students, their parents and the industry, media, College etc. who are employing them.

Yes. The University has Institute of Distance and Open Learning (IDOL) which offers many professional courses to provide flexibility of combining courses.

- This enhances employability of students.
- Besides, it also encourages and supports multidisciplinary research at later years.
- Whenever College is not in a position to offer admission to certain students, they are advised to continue in distance mode.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

The Collage offers wide range of programmes from UG to PG to Doctoral Programmes. In this regard, the College has introduced various courses mentioned in Key Aspect 1.2.1. The institute also organises seminars, paper presentation and poster making competition, film screening etc. to supplement the syllabus. There are also various academies like Scholars' Academy, Research Academy, Generation Dialogue, Students' Forum etc.

Career and Placement Cell initiates workshops, lectures and short-term Courses etc. aimed at skill development and covering present dynamic job market. (A list of initiatives is presented at Key Aspect 1.2.1.) Efforts are made to organise campus recruitment drives, job fairs etc.

Besides, various academies like Student Forum, Magazine Committee, Students' Editorial Board immensely contribute to enhancement of employability by developing leadership quality.

- Business English Certificate (BEC), Courses, Cambridge University, UK
- World Tourism Management in collaboration with Thomas Cook India Ltd.

In addition, the institution offers the add-on and certificate courses listed under 1.2.1.

2.1 Student Enrolment and Profile

The college publishes separate prospectus for Arts, Commerce and other courses, and it is priced according to the University rule. It gives clear picture of admission procedure, subject combinations, institution and facilities available, rules and regulations of examinations and also names of faculty members. In addition, publicity and transparency of these aspects are achieved through :

- Advertisement in regional and national newspapers
- The institutional website
- Longstanding reputation serves as publicity
- In-house and ex-students are directly admitted
- Students apply online
- As per the University norms, Admission Committee is formed.
- Merit list is displayed on a fixed date on the College website and notice board
- Reservation policy directives and merit are strictly followed.

For the first year Arts and Commerce (Aided Division/course), inhouse students moving upwards from the Junior College are directly admitted. If places are available, outside students are provided admissions as per the rules of the University. Students of unaided courses, such as B.Com. in Banking and Insurance, Accounts and Finance, Financial Markets, Bachelor of Management Studies, Bachelor of Mass Media in English and Marathi fill in online forms; admission is provided according to the University rules. MA Philosophy (by papers/research), MA Hindi, MA Communication and Journalism, M.Com Business Management, Accountancy, Banking and Finance, Master of Library and Information Science (Integrated Course) are the postgraduate courses run by the College; the admission procedures are as per the University guidelines.

The College has the facility of Doctoral programme in Philosophy; admission to Ph.D. is based on University guidelines.

The College is running an autonomous Postgraduate Diploma in Library Automation and Networking since 2008; the admission is on first-come-first-serve bases for anyone working in a library.

Being an affiliated college, the entire admission process is supervised by the 'Admission Committee' as prescribed by the State Government and the University of Mumbai guidelines. On the basis of information given in admission forms and interaction of teachers with students during regular lectures, the students' profiles are made. The profile indicates the following :

2.2. Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The institution caters to the needs of the differently-abled students and adheres to government policies in the following ways.

- Visually impaired students are given personal assistance in identifying and locating library resources
- Special software for audio output and a dedicated computer for low-vision students
- During examination, these students are given extra time as per the guidelines of the University and Government
- Seating arrangement of such students is made on ground floor during examination
- Extra attention and time is provided to such students
- Visually-impaired students are allowed to take a writer as per university rules
- Students' Council Members and NSS volunteers take lead in helping these students
- Parents and guardians of such students are given access to classrooms, library and other facilities in College
- A Braille section is added in the library for visually-impaired students with separate seating arrangement
- Provision of ramps at appropriate places
- Seating Arrangements are made on ground floor for differentlyabled students to appear for examination
- Government free-ship and scholarships are given to these students
- Vehicles of such students are permitted in the College premises

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes. The institution assesses the students' needs in this regard in the following manner.

• The College forms the Admission Committee at the beginning of every academic year to orient the students about subject selection at the first year.

- A team of teachers guide the students before the commencement of the programme based on their aptitude and capability while choosing subjects in the first and final year.
- Time-bound flexibility for changing subject combination
- Need-based counselling is provided to both the students and parents

2.2.3 What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with programme of their choice? (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.)

The College has deployed the following strategies to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students.

- Functional English programme was introduced for improving the language skills of vernacular medium students
- Teachers explain certain concepts in Hindi and Marathi to help students understand the subject content
- The College implements the Remedial Coaching Scheme of the UGC for the students
- The College started the Add-on courses viz. 'Certificate Course in Conversational English' and 'Gandhian Philosophy' of the University of Mumbai.
- Guest lectures are organized for enriching the subject knowledge
- Emphasis is given on inviting Visiting Faculty from industry so that students should get practical knowledge of the corporate world
- The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the College organizes lectures on Interview facing Skills, Communication Skills, Group Discussions, Aptitude Tests, Soft-Skills and career counselling sessions for the students
- Scholars' Academy, Speakers' Academy, Students' Forum and Talent Academy arrange various programmes to enrich students in public speaking, writing skills.
- The College has started two years Associate Degree Course in Sales Management and Retail Training (SMART) in association with the University of Mumbai and Hindustan Coca Cola Pvt. Ltd. from the academic year 2013-14. As the students completing HSC in Arts and Science are also eligible for this course, the orientation workshops are conducted at the first year so that they could cope – up with the subject matter.
- In the subjects/courses of Communication Skills, Business Communication, Mathematics and Statistics, tutorials are conducted to give personal attention to the students.

• In case of professional courses like Masters in Library and Information Sciences a quick course in English is given to prepare the students for the course content.

2.2.4 How does the College sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment, etc.?

For Staff

- In *Vyas Sabha* the socio-economic, political, cultural, etc. current issues are discussed by teachers.
- In the 'Staff Academy', guest lectures by eminent personalities from diverse fields are arranged.
- The College organizes the seminars and lectures on the Kashmir related issues. National and International seminars are organized on contemporary issues such as micro-finance, geography of change, economic growth-financial inclusion, women's quest for equality, etc.
- Women Development Cell (W.D.C.) arranges awareness programmes on gender sensitisation.
- Counselling Cell conducted the workshop on dealing with the teenagers and parenting skills.

For Students

- Various Committees and Academies like NSS, NCC, WDC, Students' Council, Scholars' Academy, Students' Forum, Nature Club, Generation Dialogue, Speakers' Academy, etc. conduct programmes, field visits, workshops etc. As a part of these activities, competitions in the area of PowerPoint Presentation, poster making, elocution, model-making, tree recognition, etc. are held. Exhibitions are regularly conducted on environment related issues to sensitise students.
- As per the directives of Ministry of Human Resource Development of Government of India, *Swach Bharat Abhiyaan* is implemented and *Rashtriya Ekata Diwas*, *Samvidhan Diwas*, Savitribai Phule *Smruti Din*, International Women's Day, etc. are observed in the College
- The College conducted a Workshop on Anti-Ragging and subsequently Anti-Ragging Committee and Anti-Ragging Squad were formed
- Female students are given training in Karate for self defense
- Disaster Management programmes are organized by Civil Defense unit of the College.

2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

- The Principal personally hands over the results of First and Second Year to the students in their respective class-rooms; this is one way of identifying toppers. Subsequently these students are felicitated.
- Similarly, those scoring highest marks at the 12th Board examination are identified.
- Dr. Vijay Bedekar, Chairman, Vidya Prasarak Mandal, Thane motivates the students who secured 'O' and 'A' grades.
- In addition, results of the semester V are considered as the basis to identify advanced learners.
- Further, every teacher identifies the advanced learners from class-room interactions.
- The subject specific needs of such learners are covered in the form of discussion at the class/staff room. Students desiring deeper knowledge are directed to access appropriate library resources and reference section. This promotes interactive and self-learning. This inspires the student to be life-long learners. Avenues like Speakers' Academy, Scholars' Academy and Students' Forum provide platform to acquire additional skills for personality development.
- Advanced learners in the commerce stream are identified based on TY B.Com. semester-V results and advanced level books on related subjects are lent on special loan from the library.
- There are instances where the ordinary learners with strong inner drive for learning are provided suitable and timely attention and direction.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyse and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of the society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections, etc.)?

Poor attendance, bad results and unfair means during examinations are the indicators of potential drop outs. Such students are identified and provided counseling and remedial coaching.

In addition, needy students are allowed to pay fees in instalments. Some of the students are referred to the *Satkarm Pratisthan*, a local NGO, which provides financial assistance to pay the fees.

The College plans and organizes the teaching, learning [T] and evaluation [E] schedules as follows:

 - Examinations dates of respective courses as per university regulations [E]
 - Results to be declared as per university regulations [E]

 - Number of shifts [T]
 - Master Timetable and departmental timetables are prepared and issued [T]
 - Roll call/Attendance
 - Faculty: Recruitments, Retirements, Reappointments and Retrenchment [T]
- Teaching plans are drawn by each department Examination schedules are planned by the Examination Committee [E]
- Results schedules are planned by the Result Committee [E]
- Remedial lectures for failed students are planned and organized [T]
- Academic calendar is framed based on all the above factors and list of holidays, calendar etc. Guest lectures are planned and interwoven in the regular schedule.

The Principal as the Head of the IQAC directs and supervises the entire teaching learning process.

• Most of the Teacher-Members of IQAC are also Heads of Departments, Co-ordinators, Vice-Principals, Librarian, etc. and occupy vantage positions in important operational

committees such as Examination Committee, Result Committee, Result Improvement Committee, etc.

• The quality initiatives, policies and programmes, in respect of teaching-learning are discussed by the IQAC.

In the light of these initiatives the College adopts the innovative teaching and learning processes such as:

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

This is achieved by incorporating the following elements routinely during every teaching-learning lecture / session:

- Putting the subject in proper perspective at every stage explaining the logic and systems approach while teaching leads to effective learning. WHAT, WHY and HOW of topics are explained.
- Pointing out common mistakes and misleading concepts, encouraging students to ask questions, Audio-Visual support and hands-on experience wherever suitable.
- Assignments /projects with scope for critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper encouraging students to use books as well as e-resources available in the Library.

Participation of students in practical and socially relevant projects of NSS, Department of Life-long Learning and Extension (DLLE), and activities of various Academies and Committees listed at 5.3.6

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? E.g. virtual laboratories, e-learning-resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education etc.

Technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching are listed at 2.3.3. Classrooms are provided with network connectivity. Besides, there is facility to connect LCD projectors.

In addition, the college has access to National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL). Using this resource, lectures by distinguished professors of well-known institutes can be accessed by our students.

Students are given:

- Participation in orientation and refresher courses organized by UGC Human Resource Development Centre formerly known as Academic Staff College.

- University and UGC's Minor and Major research projects

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years. What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Some of the innovative teaching methods adopted by the faculty are as follows:

- Computerised simulations, use of multi-media and role-play etc. are the innovative methods used in social sciences and humanities/languages
- Students are required to select any listed company, read its Annual Report and to calculate important Ratios and give their comments on the company
- Study material with graded solved problems coupled with unsolved home work problems are given to slow learners which leads to better understanding and learning.
- Field Visits to well-known institutes, libraries, museums, PowerPoint presentations, etc.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The library's rich collection (Digital, multi-media and paper-based) and databases provide excellent support in scholarly lecture preparations. This makes the lectures vivid, interesting and student-centered. Even students are encouraged to directly access such information sources and supplement the teaching sessions with self-learning.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time-frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

In normal circumstances, there is no difficulty in completing the curriculum within the planned time-frame and calendar.

However, in exceptional cases, sometimes certain difficulties arise. For instance,

- When senior staff are permitted to go on FIP Leave, substitute staff takes time to get used to the new assignment.
- When substantial outside assignments e.g. election and census duties etc. are given to the staff.
- Extra lectures are arranged by the teacher/ department when the curriculum seems heavy.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning?

The institute monitors and evaluates the quality of teaching-learning through the following:

- New faculty under unaided section is recruited based on Demonstration Lecture prior to the appointment.
- Lectures of newly appointed teachers are observed by the HoD and Principal, and necessary suggestions are given, if required.
- Students' Suggestions regarding teaching process are incorporated.
- Students have access to the Heads of the Departments, Coordinator, Vice-Principals, and Principal in case of any improvement or any other issue related to teaching-learning.

- Feedback forms are filled in by students, analysed and observations are conveyed to the teachers.
- Principal's Meeting with the Departments for conveying scope for improvement.
- Fifth and Sixth Semester; Summary of the results is analysed and presented at the Staff room by the Principal with suggestions for improvement, if any.

2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum.

The management foresees the likely vacancies and HR needs of the College and prepares for recruitment well in advance.

In case of visiting faculty, timing of their lectures is adjusted to suit their requirement to retain their services. In addition, for improving the teacher quality and help to update their knowledge, they are nominated for orientation, refresher and short-term courses. Similarly, the members of staff are encouraged to take up MS-CIT course.

In addition to the above strategies, recruitment is done according to the guidelines given by the University of Mumbai, State Government and the UGC.

Teaching-learning methods/approaches:

The Department of Library and Information Science had organised Refresher course under the aegis of the Academic Staff College, University of Mumbai (2011-12).

Various Guest lecturers to guide teachers on minor/major research projects and research methodology are arranged.

Handling new curriculum

Workshops to discuss the new curriculum and its impact, its methodology were conducted in collaboration with University of Mumbai in courses like BA Economics, SMART, Bachelor of Management Studies (BMS), Bachelor of Accounts and Finance (BAF), Bachelor of Mass Media (BMM), Bachelor of Financial Markets (BFM), Bachelor of Banking Insurance (BBI) and Masters of Library and Information Science (MLISc.)

Content/Knowledge management

Every year Seminars and Conferences on various contemporary issues are organised by different Departments of the college.

Research papers are invited and the best papers are published in the souvenir.

Experts are invited at the seminars and conferences as key-note speakers.

Veterans from specific fields are invited to have interactions with teachers and students through symposiums.

Selection, development and use of enrichment materials

Every year library organises an orientation session for all teachers on the use of Library resources.

Reference and Research section with well equipped updated computers and other infrastructure facilities are made available for teachers and students.

Assessment

When Credit Based Semester Grading System (CBSGS) was introduced, the University website elaborately instructed about procedures of internal and external assessment, nature of questions, etc.

Cross cutting issues

Audio-Visual Aids/multimedia

The library has access to many audio-visual multimedia resources which may be used for teaching-learning purposes. However, there is no access to Open Educational Resources (OER's).

Teaching learning material development, selection and use Although selection and use of teaching-learning materials is carried out at the College, no effort is made to develop such material. However, at individual level some teachers make their teaching material.

- Invited as resource persons in Workshops / Seminars / Conferences organised by external professional agencies : 40%

2.4.4 What policies/systems are in place to recharge teachers? (eg: providing research grants, study leave, support for research and academic publications, teaching experience in other national institutions and specialized programmes, industrial engagement etc.)

The College has Research Committee which motivates teachers for research and for academic publications. There is a grant of Rs. 1,00,000/- earmarked for research activities; this is an annual fund provided by the Management. Similarly, teachers are encouraged to apply for the UGC and University's Minor Research Grants.

Under Faculty Improvement Programme (FIP) of the UGC, those pursuing Ph.D. are given two years paid leave. In addition, those participating in Orientation, Refresher or any other relevant short-term courses are granted leave.

The Research Committee organises special lectures/workshops related to different aspects of research process. The Committee also helps in formulating objectives and hypotheses, where necessary. Teachers are encouraged to write papers for the conferences/seminars organized by the institution or others. Proceedings of the in-house conferences are published and provide a platform for the teachers to bring out their research work. The Vidya Prasarak Mandal, the Management publishes a scholarly journal, *Disha* which is an excellent forum for research publications.

The Principal of the College is invited by NGOs, schools in the vicinity and also University for delivering lectures and guiding students. In addition, the teachers from the Department of Library and Information Science are invited by other libraries of repute, universities and other professional bodies as resource persons and experts. They are also asked to conduct sessions by the UGC's Human Resource Development Centre (formerly known as Academic Staff College) during their Orientation and Refresher courses. This process energies and charges our teachers.

Similarly, the College invites experts from other institutions. The Staff Academy invites eminent personalities from different fields to address our faculty. *Vyas Sabha* is a forum meant for debating current and topical issues.

In addition, the College and Management organise national and international Conferences annually and provide a platform for writing, participation and publication. Our sister institute Dr. VN Bedekar Institute of Management Studies organises regular workshops on 'Above and Beyond Excellence' to illustrate various quality measures in academic field.

2.4.5 Give the number of faculty who received awards / recognition at the state, national and international level for excellence in teaching during the last four years. Enunciate how the institutional culture and environment contribute to such performance / achievement of the faculty.

Two professors were selected for the 'Best Teacher Award' by the University of Mumbai.

Some research papers of teachers have been adjudged as the Best Research Papers at various seminars at national and international level.

Institutional culture and environment is conducive and encouraging to maintain and sustain a high level of standard in teaching. This is achieved by

- National and international Seminars, Conferences and Workshops organised by our College, sister institutions and the Management
- Reference and Research section with the networked computers, e-journals and databases.
- Activities of Research Committee, Vyas Sabha and Staff Academy

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching- learning process?

Yes. Feedback from students is taken at the end of each semester. After analysing the feedback teachers are informed about their performance during Departmental meetings in the presence of the Principal.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

The college prospectus contains the rules and regulations about the evaluation process as per the directives issued by the University of Mumbai.

At the commencement of the First Year Degree Courses, an orientation lecture is arranged in which the Principal inform the students about the evaluation system.

Circulars about Internal and External assessment, submission of projects and assignments, practical examination are sent to all the classrooms and displayed on classroom notice boards and Common Notice Board.

Teachers inform the students about the evaluation process from time to time.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the University that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The University of Mumbai has introduced Credit Based Semester Grading System (CBSGS) with emphasis on continuous internal assessment and term-end examination. This is a major evaluation reform.

The University conducts Third Year examinations, though the College conducts First Year and Second Year examinations. It strictly adheres to the University guidelines reflecting the reforms.

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the University and those initiated by the institution on its own?

Internal and external examinations are conducted as per the University guidelines. Declaration of results within 45 days of the examination, provision of photocopies of assessed answer books where required, are some of prominent features of University guidelines related to evaluation are followed even in FY and SY assessment.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

- The University of Mumbai introduced the Credit Based Semester Grading System (CBSGS) from academic year 2011-12, which is a major structural change
- CBSGS was introduced on 60/40 pattern (External/Internal marks ratio)

- The continuous internal assessment represented the formative component and the semester-end assessment represented the summative component
- The formative component comprised two written tests of 10 marks each, one assignment of 10 marks and class-room performance during the semester carried 10 marks, i.e. a total of 40 marks
- The summative component or semester-end assessment comprised one written exam of 60 marks of two hours duration.
- Each component required a separate passing of 40% marks
- CBSGS was applied to First year classes from 2011-12 and then extended to Second Year and Third Year classes from 2012-13 and 2013-14 respectively
- Modifications:
 - From 2012-13 Two tests of 10 marks each was replaced by one test of 20 marks in internal assessment
 - From 2014-15, 60/40 pattern was replaced by 75/25 pattern (External/Internal marks ratio). In that, 20 marks test plus 5 marks class-room performance made the 25 marks of internal assessment.
- 2.5.5 Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progress and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students' results/achievements (programme/course wise for last four years) and explain the differences if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.
 - The academic progress and performance is monitored through classroom participation, internal tests and the semester end examinations and their outcome/results. The results help in identifying advanced and poor learners. As a process of monitoring, advanced learners or better performers are given extra attention and poor performers are given remedial coaching.
 - The first and second year results are distributed in the classrooms and the consolidated results are displayed on the notice-boards, and the actual mark-sheets are distributed by the College office after receiving from the University.
 - The Principal analyses Department wise results in comparison with previous year result of the students in the staff room.

2.5.6 Details on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioural aspects, independent learning, communication skills, etc.) The University adopted CBSGS since 2012-13, with provision for internal assessment. In order to have transparency in internal assessment, the College has decided to provide photocopies of the answer books, if students require. According to the latest arrangement, ratio of external to internal assessment is 75:25. This shows the weightage assigned to internal assessment. The marks assigned to internal assessment are based on test (20 marks) and participation in classroom deliveries, overall behaviour including independent learning, communication skills, etc. (5 marks).

2.5.7 Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning? If 'yes' provide details on the process and cite a few examples.

Yes. Assessment of student performance provides indicators in the following ways.

- To provide admission to the next class, testimonial for employment, etc.
- The under performers are directed for remedial coaching and counselling, where necessary
- The advanced learners are given additional support, extra books on loan etc.

2.5.8 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the college and university level?

At the College level, such cases are addressed to the examination committee which looks into these grievances and the result/report of such cases is declared within the stipulated time.

Yes. The institution is a recognized Research Centre for Ph.D. and MA in Philosophy affiliated to the University of Mumbai.

Some of the recommendations are:

- To earmark some fund for promoting research

- To identify topics for invited and in-house lectures and workshops

As a result of these recommendations the management has sanctioned One hundred thousand rupees (Rs. 100,000/-) per annum for research activity. The other two recommendations are built into the ongoing activities of the Committee.

In the last four years regular lectures on different aspects of research writing have been organized by the Committee to guide the teachers for Ph.D., Research Paper Presentations, Minor and Major Research projects, etc. One Minor Research Project from Mumbai University was approved and the project was submitted in the year 2013. Six Minor Research Projects from U.G.C. were approved. Four projects have been submitted and two are in progress.

- Adequate infrastructure and human resources: This is made in the form of a library with subscription to several International and National databases and journals, computer laboratory, language laboratory.
- Time off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers: Special leave is sanctioned in the form of FIP for those who are pursuing Ph.D. In addition, special leave is granted for presenting research papers and attending seminars and workshops.
- Support in terms of technology and information needs: Access to computers with internet and intranet connectivity:

The institution website has links to databases EBSCO, J-GATE etc. The campus is connected with Fiber Optic Network having 24/7 access to Internet via **Leased Line**. The campus is **Wi-Fi** enabled.

- Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities: Yes, the auditor of the college audits the expenditure of the research projects. The office sends the utilization certificate to the funding authorities on time.
- Any other:

The institution has Research Academy to promote research culture among students. The research Academy organizes lectures on simple aspects of research. - i. **Staff Academy** regularly organises lectures/programmes by experts in inter-disciplinary areas which have to do with layman's life.

Guest lecturers from industry and subject experts are invited to speak to the students and teachers. Vivekananda Study Circle conducts *Yoga* classes for students and teachers and organises group discussions, meditation session and guest lectures.
- iii. The College has set aside certain amount per annum to remunerate the eminent speakers.

Over 15% of the staff have availed the facility of sabbatical leave for completion of their Ph.D. programme.

Teachers can give undivided attention and timely completion of Ph.D. programme leading to better quality research. Such completed quality studies inspire other teachers to take up research work. In addition, it entices teachers to undertake Minor and Major Research Projects. Thus, a research culture is imbibed in the College.

3.2 Resource Mobilisation for Research

3.2.1 What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for Research? Give details of major heads of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

A budget of Rs.1,00,000/- is sanctioned by the Management for research from the academic year 2015-16, Within this amount of Rs. 80,000/- is earmarked for the Research Committee (for teachers) and Rs. 20,000/- for the Research Academy (for students). In addition, the funds allocated by the UGC and the University of Mumbai for the respective projects are mobilised to the researchers under various heads such as field work / equipment / contingency. Together, this secretarial assistance it amounts to be less than 1% of the total budget. [It is to be noted that the amount spent on the purchase of books, journals and databases by the library is excluded from this research fund.]

3.2.2 Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years.

A budget of Rs.1,00,000/- is sanctioned by the Management for research from the academic year 2015-16. Out of this, Rs. 80,000/ is earmarked for the Research Committee and the balance for the Research Academy. But, there is seed money as such.

3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

Indirect financial assistance in the form of secretarial assistance, computing and photocopying facilities are extended to the students for conducting their research projects. In addition, now Rs 20,000/- is earmarked for student research out of Rs 1,00,000/- sanctioned for Research activity by the Management.

3.2.4 How does the various departments / units / staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavours and challenges faced in organising interdisciplinary research.

In-house training / lectures on information searching skills, research methodology, writing skills etc. are the formal interactions that take place among the researchers.

If high degree, continuous interaction is required, the staff of the allied subject is included as a co-investigator or co-author.

3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by it's staff and students?

As this is an Arts and Commerce College, the research process does not require subject-specific scientific laboratory / equipment. Computer and library are the two facilities used in the research process in the College.

The institution subscribes several online databases and journals. The librarian addresses the staff and students every year and explains the utility of these valuable resources. Everyday over 80 students and up to 20 teachers avail these rich resources.

Computing facilities and telecommunication facilities like Wi-Fi, Information Resources / Data Research bases facilitate accessing data using their laptop.

No. Not yet. However, the research committee is exploring the possibility of availing some grants to develop suitable research facility ideal for Arts and Commerce Colleges.

The support is provided in the form of discussions organised by Research Committee which enables the principal investigator to polish and fine-tune the research themes. Research Committee helps in identifying and liaising with funding agencies. Besides, the Committee also follows up the proposals with the funding authorities. The Principal of the College deputes the Vice-Principal and the Librarian to the UGC's Regional Office and the University of Mumbai to follow up the proposals.

Access to international databases and journals and computing facilities are the major support provided to researchers. Campus wide Wi-Fi facility is also available.

Computer laboratories which happen to be the main tools of research have been upgraded based on the changing need and sophistication. Correspondingly license for certain new software have been obtained.

The licenses for databases are renewed and new databases are added regularly.

In addition, facilities mentioned at 3.1.3 are also available for research.

Although no specific grants have been received from any nongovernment agency for research, certain grants have been received for specific Minor Research Projects from the UGC and the University of Mumbai. These grants are used for acquiring instruments / facilities / equipment such as laptops, camera etc. In the last four years approximately Rs. 2 lakhs have been received for acquiring instruments and supporting research. These equipment are submitted to the College by the research scholars after the project is completed.

Besides having access to certain databases like Open J-Gate, CMIE, Manupatra, etc., information support from American Centre is made available. In addition, inter-library loan can be availed from the University of Mumbai and other academic institutions such as TISS, IIPS etc.

3.5 Consultancy

3.5.1 Give details of the systems and strategies for establishing institute-industry interface.

The Career Guidance and Placement Cell of the College strives to establish institute-industry interface for the benefit of students. It coordinates with industry and organises recruitment drives in order to provide suitable jobs to students. There are many occasions when the industries organize training sessions for students on several relevant topics such as 'Interview Facing Skills', 'Group Discussion', 'Communication Skills', etc.

During the last five years, on an average, around 10 companies per year have visited the college. Students from both aided and un-aided sections have been the beneficiaries. Over 120 students have been absorbed by these companies during the report period. Further, there is an MoU with Thomas Cook to provide training and employment to our students.

In addition, the College is one of four institutes under the University of Mumbai to offer Associate degree in Sales Management and Retail Training (SMART) in association with Hindustan Coca Cola Beverages Pvt. Ltd. MoU to this effect has been signed in the academic year 2012-13.

The institute has a policy to promote consultancy in the form of Counseling activities. The Counseling Cell helps all the stakeholders, sister institutes under VPM and the people in the neighbourhood, students and even outsiders. [An Overview: The library of Joshi-Bedekar College enjoys the reputation of being one of the premier college libraries in the vicinity of Mumbai. The library was established in 1969 along with the college. The library is situated on the second floor of the commerce building and is made easily accessible from all sides of the college premises. It has a carpet area of about 12000 Sq. Ft.

Complete catalogue of the library holdings has been created by using *LibSuite* asp version. Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) is provided to the users. Students are using the OPAC extensively for searching the required books and journals. The library is connected with the other four libraries on the campus and an integrated OPAC of the holding is made available to all users. Inter library loan of Books is provided to the students and teachers on demand.

Computers of all the libraries on the campus are connected to the central server. Local hub is provided in each library for speedy communication of data. The important feature of the library is that its catalogue can be accessed from any part of the world through web OPAC made available at www.vpmthane.org. The library has a privilege of using 2 MBPS Internet leased line.

The library provides online access facility to the students and faculty members to the internationally reputed commercial databases like JSTOR, ProQuest, CMIE, Manupatra, UGC N-LIST, Dictionary of Scientific Biographies, and open access databases viz Vidyanidhi, Shodhganga Open J-Gate, OpenDOAR, DOAJ, PubMed, SSRN, PloS, COCHRANE. Digital Repository of Vidya Prasarak Mandal's institutional research publications has been created and made available at <u>http://dspace.vpmthane.org:8080/jspui/index.jsp</u>. Library uploads previous three years' question papers for all the

classes/subjects on our website and students can use link *http://www.vpmthane.org/comm/Q_paper.html* to get e-question papers. From the academic year 2009-2010 library is issuing Smart Identity Card to all students, staff and external members of the library. The separate workstation for smart card generation has been created in the Reading Hall Section of the library.]

The Principal monitors various activities and work of departments by regular meetings with Heads of Departments, Office staff, chairpersons of curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular committees. She also ensures adherence to the rules through regular in-house reports.

Runanubandha: *Naate Tumche Aamche*, gathering of retired teachers aims at meeting, felicitation and interaction on certain subjects of concern.

Any other relevant information regarding student support and progression which the college would like to include.

- Rotating trophy for Best Class of the College is awarded during Annual Prize Distribution function.
- Motivation and support received from various academies inspired the students to join/form NGO.

6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

While policy making is a 'Bottom-Up' process, implementation is 'Top-Down' in nature. The role of the various authorities can be summed up as follows.

It is the 'top management' which formulates supportive policy regarding maintenance, sustenance and enhancement of the institution, its quality and its facilities. Ideas and proposals are received from the faculty and the Principal. These suggestions are discussed at various bodies/forums such as the Local Managing Committee (LMC), College Committee (CC) and, Principals' and Directors' monthly meetings with Management. In addition, suggestions of the IQAC, Alumni, Students' Council, Campus Community and the prospective employers participating in campus placements are also incorporated. Thus, all the stakeholders are democratically involved in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans.

The Management follows a democratic and participative style of leadership, soliciting the total participation and active involvement of both teaching and non-teaching staff. Thus, involvement of leadership ensure –

The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission:

- The Principal of the College has long term vision for both, academics and administration. She guides, initiates, persuades and convinces the staff to actively involve themselves in realizing the goals and objectives of the Management.
- Encourage the stakeholders in achieving the various goals implied in the mission statement.
- In addition to this, she also co-ordinates with outside agencies like the University authorities, UGC, Joint Director's office and other government bodies to comply with the necessary regulations.
- She follows open door communication policy and often allows the staff to come up with constructive suggestion and pressing grievances, if any.

Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan:

• The action plans for operations are prepared under the supervision and guidance of the Principal and Heads of the Departments.

- For Example: Teaching Plans, timetable arrangements, various committees, etc. are initiated into their defined roles in formulating and achieving the strategic plan.
- To ensure that all the sanction plans enumerated above are in consistency with the overall strategic plan prepared by the institution well in advance.

Interaction with stakeholders:

The leader ensures that all stakeholders are involved in institutional activities. Students, being the main stakeholders are treated as the centre of all activities and many curricular and co-curricular activities are conducted for their benefit. The College interacts with the parents of the students. The leadership places special focus on community in the vicinity of the College and maintains a cordial relationship with the local Police Station so that the safety of the College is ensured. The College maintains a continuous communication with the stakeholders. Management/ Principal ensures that all the stakeholders such as the following are involved.

- **Staff:** The Principal interacts with the staff member through HoD's meetings, Staff meetings, *Vyas Sabha*, Staff Academy, etc. The principal and the faculty interact with the students regarding their grievances and consider them as top priority in the matters to be redressed through Mentor system.
- **Students:** The Principal Interacts with the students in the Orientation programme, in the Departmental functions, Students' Council, Students' Forum, etc. Curricular and co-curricular activities are conducted for their benefit.
- **Parents:** Mentor of the class interacts with the individual parents at the meetings where progress of students is discussed, feedback is given about students. Similarly, feedback and suggestions are obtained from parents for the improvements in the quality of education and other infrastructural facilities.
- **The Other Stakeholders:** The Principal interacts and involves the other stakeholders such as the Management, Alumni, prospective employers, coaches of games, etc.

Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders:

The Management and the Principal are committed for ensuring a proper environment supporting and accomplishing the various policies. For this purpose appropriate plans and programmes are formulated, implemented analysed and evaluated in consultation with the stakeholders.

Reinforcing the culture of excellence:

The institution strives for excellence. This is seen in the following three accomplishments.

- The NAAC awarded the College with 'A' Grade in the 2nd Cycle
- Adjudged for the `Best College Award` by the University of Mumbai
- Selected by University of Mumbai for starting a Community College

Champion organizational change:

Emphasis is on providing exposure to the new developments in knowledge frontier through National and International Seminars, Conferences, etc.

6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

There are clear cut procedures in place to monitor and evaluate policies and plans for effective implementation and improvement from time to time like:

- College has a duly constituted Local Management Committee (LMC); College Committee (CC) etc. which enables the Management/ Head of the institution to get adequate information in order to review the activities of the College.
- Staff members have to fill in the Academic Performance Indicators (API) forms according to the UGC regulations. The Head of the College gives them constructive feedback regarding the same.
- Staff meetings are held regularly to take stock of the activities undertaken by the various Committees dealing with Examination,

Library, Unfair Means Inquiry, Women Development Cell and Anti-Ragging, Gymkhana, Students Council, Attendance, Timetable, Discipline, etc.

6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management?

The Heads of the Departments are appointed as per the norms laid down by the University. They are given academic freedom to conduct the various Departmental activities under the supervision of the Principal. The organization provides support to the teachers by nominating them for Refresher courses and Orientation Programs. The college also encourages research leading to Ph.D. by extending Faculty Development Programme (FDP). etc. Similarly, the leadership motivates the teachers to take up major, minor researches, writing research articles, attending seminars/conferences.

In addition, an in-house discussion forum '*Vyas Sabha*' and invited lectures organized by the 'Staff Academy' from time-to-time triggers fresh thinking.

6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

The College grooms leadership qualities of teaching, non-teaching staff and students as mentioned below:

Teaching Staff

- All staff members are involved in various activities of the college. While senior staff members are appointed as chairpersons, conveners of different committees, juniors are involved as leaders at operational levels.
- They are given liberty to plan and monitor the events/activities. Adequate guidance is provided by the seniors from time to time.
- New comers are groomed to work in various capacities under different co-curricular and extra-curricular committees. Teachers are nominated for different courses organised by the UGC's Human Resource Development Centre and Management Development Programmes (MDP) of professional bodies. [This includes leadership programmes, research methodology courses, SPSS, MIS training etc.]

Non-Teaching Staffs

The College encourages them to pursue higher education and skillbased trainings required for professional growth. Similarly, motivational lectures and programmes are organized to ensure their inner growth.

Students

Various Curricular and co-curricular activities such as Students' Council, NSS, NCC, Seminars, Intercollegiate festivals like *Gandharva*, Chrysalis are undertaken for the students. These activities provide opportunities to the students to organize the events under the supervision of teacher in-charge which inculcate a leadership quality. During the Annual Prize distribution programme, those who have excelled in various activities are rewarded with awards, such as 'The Best Student' etc.

6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The College delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the Departments of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system like,

- Management gives sufficient authority or freedom to the Principal.
- Academic responsibilities are fairly divided among the various Departments.
- Heads (Aided Section) coordinate activities of their respective departments.
- Two Coordinators and an Assistant Coordinator manage the unaided or self-financed sections.
- Committees are appointed for various co-curricular and extracurricular activities with members drawn from different departments. The chairpersons and members of the committees are given freedom to plan and execute their activities. Every academic year the composition of Committees changes, so that fresh ideas are injected into activities. Student members of various co-curricular and extra-curricular are given leadership

training by permitting them to conduct various programmes. Office administration is headed by Registrar and a team of personnel such as Superintendent, Head Clerk, Senior Clerks. They are given operational autonomy for routine responsibilities.

6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes, the college promotes a culture of participative management at various levels such as Local Management Committee, College Committee, HoD meetings, staff meetings etc.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

The Vision and Mission Statements serve as an all-round, written formal quality policy. In view of this, all curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities stem from the Mission/Vision Statements. This implied policy is deployed through different departments, committees and academies.

These activities are reviewed in HoD's meetings, staff meetings, Local Managing Committee (LMC), College Committee (CC), Principals' and Directors' Meet with Management, IQAC, etc. The reviewing is a process of churning. This, in turn, helps in reflecting on the quality conscious spirit. The result of such a review of implied policy is seen in the following year's programmes.

6.2.2 Does the Institute have a perspective plan for development? If so, give the aspects considered for inclusion in the plan?


Yes. There is a master plan of the Vidya Prasarak Mandal on which resides six institutions and the common facilities. All the developmental plans have to be within the physical parameters built into the master plan. Aspects covered are:

The decisions flow from top-down and feedback, programme innovation move bottom-up. The entire organization functions on participative and consultative style of management through regular meetings at different frequencies and levels.

Research and Development

• Encouragement and motivation to the teachers for doing Ph.D., Major and Minor research projects; Ph.D.: 7 completed and 9 in progress . Paid leave is granted under FDP programme.

- Minor Research Projects (MRP): 4 Approved and 7 in progress
- Duty leave is granted for attending conferences / seminars
- **Research Committee** conducts lectures and workshops giving guidance on research methodology, paper writing, paper presentations, paper publications and use of library resources including online and e-resources on a regular basis.
- **Research Academy** of the College develops research culture among students by conducting projects on the issues related to students and society, such as study habits, pocket money, negative effects of tobacco products, etc.

Community Engagement

- Sensitizing and motivating students to participate in NSS, NCC and various community oriented programs such as cleanliness, AIDS awareness, blood donation and street plays on various social issues.
- Maintaining liaison with law and order authorities, NGOs and other local bodies such as Thane Police, TMC, Civil Hospital, etc.

Human Resource Management

- Providing stress-free, fair, non-discriminatory, positive, progressive work environment
- Open Door Policy for sorting of matters by discussion and consensus
- Top priority for faculty development
- Class III and IV non-teaching staff is motivated to improve their educational qualifications and technical skills
- There are many facilities such as
 - A gymnasium and a *Yoga* center for the teachers and students. *Swar Sampada*, a programme for enhancing the singing skills of the teachers.

- Staff Academy exclusively for teachers in which intellectuals from various fields are invited to deliver lectures.
- Employer's Co-operative Credit Society through which easy loans are made available to its members.
- Encouragement to non-teaching staff to improve their qualifications.
- A Counselling Cell to cater to the emotional problems of students as well as teachers.

Industry Interaction

- Appointment of maximum number of visiting faculty with industrial experience
- Arranging guest lectures by industry experts and professionals
- Organization of Industrial visits and field visits for students
- Arranging for career guidance, counseling, soft-skill development, campus interviews and placement for students
- Started two year Associate Degree programme in Sales Management and Retail Training (SMART) in collaboration with University of Mumbai and Hindustan Coca Cola Beverages Pvt. Ltd.
- Students of MLISc. programme complete their internship of three weeks duration with TIFR, TISS, IIPS, IIT, RBI, IGIDR, AIRC, etc.
- The College got into an MoU with Thomas Cook India Ltd. enabling regular training and placement.

6.2.5 How does the Head of the Institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

Adequate information is made available through.

• Monthly meetings of campus Principals and Directors with the Management.

Considering the institutional process to include all activities related to teaching and providing managerial support and seeking involvement of staff in the following form.

- *Disha* magazine is the platform provided by the Management to encourage the teachers to publish their articles.
- Various conferences at national and international levels are organized by the management and staff is involved in various capacities. Teachers are asked to write papers which are subsequently published as books/proceedings.

Generally the 'Management Council' functions at the university level. However, at the College level there is a Local Management Committee (LMC) constituted as per the provisions of the Maharashtra Universities Act 1994, and major decisions regarding the College are made at the Vidya Prsarak Mandal's Governing Body Meetings. The decisions made by the LMC and the related status regarding implementation are confidential, and therefore, will be presented at the time of Peer Team Visit.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If 'yes', what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

University organizes the meetings for discussing the issue of autonomy to the Colleges and encourages them to go for autonomy. The proposal is under consideration of the VPM.

6.2.9 How does the institution ensure that grievances/complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

Grievances and complaints are handled through the following formal internal agencies/devices.

- Grievance Redressal Cell
- Women Development Cell (WDC)
- Backward Class Cell (BC Cell)
- Complaint Register for Dalit Students
- Complaint / Suggestion Boxes
- Anti-Ragging Committee

In addition, for any immediate/urgent problems one can walk into the Principal's room as the institution believes in 'Open-Door-Policy'.

As the institute follows stress-free, fair, non-discriminatory, positive, progressive work environment, the number of complaints received is minimal. Hence, the need for analysis is not felt.

6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

In the last four years no court case has been filed by or against the institution.

The above programmes and strategies ensure empowerment of staff.

Teachers are asked to fill-in the Performance-Based-Appraisal System (*PBAS*) Forms, and those with adequate Academic Performance Indicators (API) are recommended for Career Advancement Scheme (CAS).

Teachers from unaided section fill in Self-assessment form, and on the bases of their Annual Confidential Reports, continuation of employment and additional increments or promotion etc. are decided. Besides, based on the self-assessment, staff are advised to undergo appropriate training and research.

The Institutional Mechanism for monitoring effective utilization of financial resources is carried out by two major processes.

Two LMC meetings are held, one for the approval of budgets and the second for the comparison of the budget with the actuals. The earmarked budgets are compared with the actual based upon the audited statements in the LMC meetings.

 - Regional Senior Auditor, Dept. of Higher Education (External Audit)

Two objections were raised by the Accountant General and the College has taken the corrective measures. The details will be made available at the time of Peer Team Visit.

6.4.3. What are the major sources of institutional receipts / funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with the Institutions, if any?

The major sources in respect of receipts / funding can be highlighted as follows:

- Salary grants received from Government of Maharashtra is to the extent of 100% of the salary payable minus the Tuition fees received from the students. In case of Unaided Section, tuition fees is used for salaries.
- UGC grants for (i) Equipment and Development (ii) Remedial Coaching and Entry in Services schemes.
- Other fees such as Admission Fees, Library Fees, Disaster Relief Fund, etc of which approximately 40% is given to the University and the balance 60% is used for college activities as per the University norms.

- The deficit, if any, is met by the management.
- There is no reserve fund / corpus.

6.4.4. Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and utilization of the same (if any).

The College sought the UGC grants of Rs.2,00,100/- under the 11^{th} Plan. The College also received the amount of Rs.14,40,000/- towards the Merged Schemes during the 11^{th} Plan.

Apart from above mentioned regular grants, the College applied for and received Additional Grant of Rs. 35,60,000/- From the UGC for augmentation of academic infrastructure, etc.

All these grants were utilized and the UGC has given 'No Objection Certificate' to the same.

 - a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If 'yes', what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it

contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Yes, the Institution has an IQAC in place.

The institutional policy with regard to quality assurance is outlined in the following tenets:

- To provide focused attention on all students disregard of being slow or advanced learners
- To promote ICT enabled teaching-learning
- To develop research culture
- To ensure all-round growth of students with respect to curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities
- To strengthen Career Guidance and Placement Cell
- To stress on the needs of the students from weaker sections of the society
- To develop library collection and services to meet the needs of general, visually challenged and research oriented users.
- To train non-teaching staff in work-culture related areas
- To start some need-based, value-added add-on courses

These policy statements serve as a checklist in devising services such as remedial coaching, uninterrupted power supply, internet connectivity, Wi-Fi, research committee, various Academies/Committees (eg.: Students' Forum, Research Academy, Speakers' Academy, Talent Academy etc.), liaising with prospective employers and getting into MoU in this regard, giving training to develop soft skills, providing free-ships, UGC's 'Entry in Service Scheme', Braille section, subscribing to international databases/eresources, etc.

b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management/authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

At least one decision regarding each objective stated above was made. The subsequent suggestions stemming from the objectives were aimed at quality improvement. The related recommendations were made to the Management for approval. All such recommendations have been approved and implemented.

c. Does the IQAC have external members on its Committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes. Shri Vishnu Kanhere an eminent Chartered Account is an external member in the IQAC He stressed the importance of feedback, followed by its analysis and informing the findings of feedback to the corresponding teachers.

d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

Students provide useful inputs through feedback mechanism. The feedback forms are analysed and some open-ended suggestions are also noted by the IQAC.

Similarly, Students' Council, student members of other Committees, Academies and the Alumni association also generate inputs and feedback for improving quality of various activities.

e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC communicates with teaching and non-teaching staff through its meetings and notifications. It engages the teaching and non-teaching staff through various Committees and Academies. Certain teachers with related skills and experience are made chairpersons of different Academies and Committees.

6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If 'yes', give details on its operationalisation.

Yes, the institution has an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities.

- Both academic and office related activities are supervised by the Principal and her administrative team which include Vice Principals, Course Coordinators, Librarian, Registrar and the IQAC Coordinator.
- In planning and execution of the College activities such as admission, roll-call preparation, examination, Centralized Assessment Programme (CAP), result preparation, verification

and declaration etc. both teaching and non-teaching staff are involved.

6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If 'yes', give details enumerating its impact.

Yes. The institution provides training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures, details of the same are as follows:

- Heads of Departments guide and train the newly recruited and junior colleagues in respect of effective teaching, paper-setting, assessment etc.
- Motivational and training programmes are conducted for Office staff
- Library conducts orientation programmes explaining the use of Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) system, web-OPAC, etc to the new teachers and students
- Staff members are encouraged to attend Seminars, Workshops, Orientation Programmes, Refresher Courses, etc.

One of the major impacts of these initiatives is that the College activities are carried out smooth, effective and efficiently.

6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

No. However, the process of conducting the external academic audit of the University of Mumbai is under consideration.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The requirements of external quality assurance agencies /regulatory authorities such as the University of Mumbai, the Joint Director of Higher Education, the State Government and the HRD Ministry of the Central Government etc. are mainly related to the following areas:

- Admission procedures, rules and regulations
- Staff appointments and remuneration

- Adequacy and maintenance of infrastructure including Library
- Conduct of Examinations
- Assessment and declaration of results
- Conduct of co-curricular activities
- Online Submission of a variety of forms, mark-lists and other data

Specific requirements in the above areas are communicated to Colleges by the Regulatory authorities through Circulars/ letters etc. These usually relate to Content and time-deadlines. Top priority is given for implementation of such requirements by the concerned Committees.

6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operation and outcome?

The teaching learning process is continuously reviewed as follows:

- The following mechanisms are used for this purpose:
 - Preparation of individual Time-tables and Teaching-plans
 - o Regular Feedback from students about Teaching-Learning
 - Meeting of the Principal with individual Departments, with HoDs, and the meeting of the HoD with his colleagues
- Arranging for substitute teaching staff where necessary during the Terms
- The Principal after analysing the final year results, compares it with the previous year's performance and presents at the staff room. This provides help in setting targets for the following year.

The above process involves the Principal, Vice Principals, HoD of each Department, Coordinators and the Office Staff. This structure of decision making uses the methodology of meetings, taking rounds, informing the content of circulars from time-to-time, etc.

This process ensures high internal quality in teaching-learning.

CRITERIA VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

7.1 Environment Consciousness

7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Yes. The Institute has conducted a Green Audit. Some of important observations are:

- Various projects on topics related to environmental conservation have been undertaken by the teachers/institution
- All the initiatives for environment conservation are supported with well-documented procedures
- The College should try to provide information and feedback on water use to campus users, staff and students

(Detailed report will be made available at the time of the Peer Team visit.)

7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the College to make the campus eco-friendly?

- Energy conservation
- Use of renewable energy
- Water harvesting
- Check dam construction
- Efforts for carbon neutrality
- Plantation
- Hazardous waste management
- e-waste management
- a) **Energy Conservation**: Energy Audit helps the institution in optimising energy cost and ensuring better environment by identifying the areas where excess use of energy is noticed. This is the step towards energy conservation.

- b) **Use of Renewable Energy**: The management has installed Solar panels to generate electricity. The energy generated is used to light the campus during the nights and for the use at the canteen for various heating processes.
- c) **Water Harvesting**: Although there is no conventional water harvesting, the waste water generated is diverted to plants on the campus.
- d) **Check Dam Construction**: There is no scope to construct check dam on the Campus. But under environment enrichment programme, NSS along with *Hariyali*, an NGO, has constructed check dams at Lonad and Padagha.
- e) Efforts for Carbon Neutrality: The management has encouraged extensive tree plantation programme. There are lots of trees on the college campus as a result of annual tree plantation programme. Students are not permitted to bring their vehicles in the campus. Green-pathway is a road covered with plants, encircling the campus. This path is a source of clean air on the campus.
- f) Plantation: Every year, on 1st August (The Foundation Day of the VPM), tree plantation is done on the College campus. NSS and Nature Club plant trees on campus on a regular basis. Nature Club has developed 'Sahyadri Biodiversity Park' on the Campus which includes more than 150 species of Sahyadri range and Konkan. These 150 species include many medicinal plants.
- g) **Hazardous Waste Management**: This being an Arts and Commerce College, no hazardous waste is generated in the teaching-learning processes.
- h) E-Waste Management: The College has identified outdated e-waste such as CPUs, keyboards, printers, etc. These objects are kept aside and will be disposed off through appropriate agencies. More than 70% of the printing job is done at the examination section. The cartridges used in this section are bio-degradable.

In addition, under the guidance of Asst. Prof. Pradnya Nikam, students of Nature Club initiated a project named 'magic box' by collecting the biomass waste from the College campus, and then it was converted into organic fertilizer using bacteria. Nearly 6 kgs of organic fertilizer was generated in this project.

7.2 Innovations

7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the College.

The College has introduced the following innovations in last four years.

- The College has asked all the teachers/paper-setters to submit the soft copy of question papers, so that the printing/page designing cost is reduced substantially.
- The College organizes work-related training sessions, lectures and workshops for office staff. This enabled every member of the office staff to understand each others' work. There are two main advantages. First, the work is not held up, if anyone is absent for some time. Second, fresh thinking is injected because staff can be transferred.
- The General Register, Admission register, daily fee-sheets, fees register are made online. Direct payment of fees into bank etc has saved the redundant, repetitive work.
- Seven teachers have availed the FIP/FDP facility. This has increased the number of teachers pursuing and completing Ph.D.

7.3 Best Practices

7.3.1 Elaborate on any two best practices which have contributed to the achievement of the Institutional Objectives and/or contributed to the Quality Improvement of the core activities of the College.

Best Practice-1

Title of the Practice: Grooming Students through the Legacy of Swami Vivekanand

Goal: Transformation of youth towards nation building

Empowering and orienting individual students is a bottom-up process of nation building. Looking at the size of the nation and the cultural diversity, this is an uphill task. It is a positive revolution which starts by reorienting the student by catching them young.

Swami Vivekanand's life and teachings are perennial source of inspiration. His ideas give goal and methodology for such a transformation of an individual.

The envisaged change has to be built in the minds of students. Several other vital aspects of self-development besides scholastic learning have to be borrowed from Swami Vivekanand's teachings. This is a movement that should begin in small measure and should gradually catch-up. In a nutshell, *Yoga* will be used as a tool for self-development of students leading to healthy nation building.

The Context

Majority of today's students are victims of many social maladies/evils; they are addicted to tobacco chewing, smoking, drinking, drugs and watching pornography etc. They are misguided, as there are no role-models around them.

When youth/students are mislead, it not only affects them and their future, but also parents and family, their dreams, and the nation. This is how the national development and this issue are connected. This is a challenging issue which needs immediate action or attention.

Swami Vivekanand is an undisputed national hero worthy of being a role-model. His work and teachings, especially to the youth of world, in general and India, in particular are invaluable. He succeeded in mastering the vast cultural and spiritual knowledge. Youth is the time when nature has given enormous energy to the individual.This energy should not be wasted. Swami Vivekanand's teachings have to be used as a catalyst in speeding up nation building.

This type of transformation brought about at the mental level is more permanent in nature. A special feature about Swami Vivekanand and bringing in changes at mental level is that there are no repercussions or side effects. Swami's teachings are above caste, religion and language. This is a definite way of bringing in positive change.

1. The Practice

Planning and implementing the activities is carried out by a Committee named 'Vivekananda Study Circle', comprising teachers and students.

The Committee works in close coordination with Vivekananda Kendra, Kanyakumari and Ambika Kutir, Thane.

Vivekananda Kendra is the well-known organization having nationwide network and international presence. Its mission is to spread the message and teachings of Swami Vivekananda across the world especially to the youth.

Ambika Kutir is a Thane based NGO having wide spread presence within India and also across the globe in countries like USA, Canada, Mauritius, Dubai, Australia, etc. committed to the spread of *Yoga* among all sections of society for several decades since 1965.

The practice includes the following,

- Conducting *Yoga* Training programmes for students
- Arranging Guest lectures on various topics such as teachings of Swami Vivekanand, *Yoga*, memory development, concentration, meditation, patriotism and Indian culture, etc.
- Conducting seminars/workshops/orientation programmes on philosophy of Swami Vivekanand
- Conducting tests, PowerPoint Presentations and competitions about the life, work and teachings of Swami Vivekanand
- International *Yoga* Day was observed on 21 June 2015.

The importance of *Yoga* has gained higher recognition in recent years and has been included in varying degrees in the school curriculum in the country. In view of this, the College decided to give prominence to *Yoga*. Thus, this practice was initiated.

Details of Implementation of the Practice are presented in the following table.

Evidence of Success

The entire set of activities has received a good response from students irrespective of caste, creed and religion. This is because the teachings of Swami Vivekananda have been presented as a scientific means of development of a human being to its full potential. In fact, what he presented was a universal wisdom for the benefit of the entire humanity. This is in line with our Vision- 'Information to Knowledge and from Knowledge to Wisdom'.

While the table above shows the quantitative indication of the impact of this practice, it has brought in many qualitative improvements in the students. Those who were introverts started mixing and participating in the classroom discussions and participating in extra-curricular activities. There was marked improvement in their academic performances.

Participation in *yoga* practice and the related programmes was disregard of their religious faith, castes and socio-economic divisions.

This practice is in vogue since five years. The results are encouraging both quantitatively and qualitatively. This programme is given some organized publicity through circulars, and it is has sustained through a word of mouth from those who have experienced the benefits of participation.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Problems

The implementation of the practice involves a few problems as follows.

Designing programmes to meet the problems of the mislead youth

Identification of suitable resource persons to comprehensively meet the issues

Fixing batch timings for participating students without clash with their other activities and lectures

Providing space for conduct of *Yoga* training programmes especially during monsoon

This particular practice is low-cost and requires minimum equipment and financial resources. Hence, problems encountered are negligible.

Resources required include the following:

Services of *Yoga* trainers Guest speakers Space for *Yoga* training Provision of student volunteers and teacher guides

Thus, resources required are also minimal as NGOs often provide the services of trainers and speakers free of cost.

Notes

The students undergoing higher education in colleges are usually in a sensitive age group. They are also in the process of shaping their thinking, ideals, careers and relating to the external environment consisting of family, society, employment or profession, nation and entire mankind. At this juncture, imbibing the students with the message and teachings of Swami Vivekanand can ensure a correct orientation to their lives so as to become responsible citizens. If, such exposure is not made available to the students, then they are at risk of being mislead by other negative forces which can harm their development as well as that of the nation.

Any institution of higher education desiring to implement this practice would be well advised to go through the following stages:

- Establishing a suitable committee/association of teachers to oversee the entire process
- Creating awareness among the students about the importance and benefits of these activities
- Contacting and arranging with appropriate NGOs.
- Designing and finalizing specific schedules for implementation
- Motivating and moulding suitable student leaders and volunteers to execute the various tasks and programmes
- Arranging for necessary space and equipment for conducting *Yoga* sessions for students' batches
- Inviting resource persons with the help of NGOs

Best Practice-2

Title of the Practice: Taking the Students towards Knowledge Society

Goal: Preparing Students to be the citizens of knowledge society

The decision making in the society is driven by economics, social science, politics, sciences, technology, media etc. Similarly, in the information/knowledge society, decision making happens through all such knowledge-based disciplines. Every aspect of society is driven by knowledge management. It requires different types of training inputs. This practice makes students fit to live in knowledge society.

In other words, the conventional education trains students to live in conventional society. The practice considered here helps the students to take their rightful place in the knowledge society. This requires special skills, expertise, observation, wide reading, listening etc and focused training in related areas.

The Context

The knowledge society we live in provides ample opportunities. There are many avenues of information available in libraries, on the web sites, multi-media and in scholarly communication. There are billions and billions of websites giving all types of information. Particularly, for students, it is all the more difficult, as they have to invest time in scholastic reading. Thus, there is an information overload experienced by everyone.

In addition, there are many soft skills which are essential for successful survival in information/knowledge society. Public speaking, listening, telephone manners, etc. are the skills that have got to do with sharing and spreading knowledge. Book and magazine reviewing, group discussions etc. are the other devices of sharing knowledge. Besides, everyone who is literate cannot read in technical sense. How to read is a skill in itself. One must know how to read fast without affecting comprehension. Looking to the magnitude of published knowledge available, it is difficult to be aware of existence of a book or piece of information, leave alone getting time for reading it.

The context and development of knowledge society has evolved in a socio-political background. The social component is easily visible, but the political process in which it is evolved is to be experienced by the students. Therefore, the students should be exposed to parliamentary

practices. In view of this students were encouraged and sent to attend Youth Parliament sessions or role play sessions.

The challenging issues in this context were how to motivate the students for such an activity as they are attracted towards several other light activities and attractions of their age. To set the time for this is also a difficult task with different college timings of the students.

The Practice

For effective implementation of the practice a committee named **Students' Forum** was formed consisting of teachers and students. One of the Vice-Principals functions as adviser to this Committee. It is directly monitored by the Principal. The programmes are finalised in consultation with the Principal and Vice-Principals. Regular discussions, debates and lectures are organized on the contemporary issues or aspects of knowledge society. College tries to invite experts/authorities to interact with the students.

Topics such as cyber crime, election process, Live-in-relationship-Legal and social perspectives, Social Responsibility of Media, Whether College elections to be held? Projection of Women in Media, Expectations from the Central Government, etc. are covered.

To inculcate and develop reading habit book and magazine review activities are carried out.

In knowledge society there is information overload and digital divide. It is not possible for everyone to know everything. Therefore, there should be some method of effortlessly sharing knowledge. It is done by two major methods. First, invite experts to speak about their areas of specializations, and second, organize books / magazine review / discussions so that a few persons read the documents and share the content among many and comment about them.

'Model Youth Parliament' is one of the formal devices to get the practical experience and knowledge of working of the Parliament, Prime Minister, Ministers and Speaker. As per the guidelines of Department of Students' Welfare of the University of Mumbai, Model Youth Parliament was organized on 20th August 2014. Around 70 students participated. The College won the Second Prize; Eleven students were selected for the University Team.

Similarly, students have participated in Zonal round of 'Model Youth Parliament' at the University of Mumbai (2015), Bharti Vidyapeeth, Pune (2015) and similar activities organized by the local Colleges. Our students have not only won prizes in these events, but were also invited to Delhi in this regard.

Problems Encountered and Resources Required

Problems

The following problems were encountered in the course of implementing

- Lecture-timings of the member teachers and time of the programs of the Forum are same. Hence, teachers and students find it difficult to attend the programmes. Some *ad hoc* changes are made to suit students and teachers.
- Non availability of *Kattyayan* (the auditorium) or Conference room.

- In the past, coordinating with each members of the group was a challenge. This remains a problem despite availability of Whatsap and other such communication tools.
- It is difficult to get experts who can share the experience of the legislature and who will guide about protocols of parliament or parliament procedures and other aspects of this best practice.
- Overcoming students' general resistance to travel especially in case of girl students where overnight stay is required.

This practice does not require substantial resources. Most of requirements are related to infrastructure. Any extra resources such as arranging resource persons, their travel allowances, remuneration, etc, are met by the College.

Notes

This particular practice has given good results in allowing students to shape themselves for becoming responsible citizens. Any institution interested in adopting this practice may consider the following aspects which can help them in implementation.

In our College this best practice is implemented through 'Student Forum'. In case, any organization, which wishes to follow this practice, need to examine the functions and duties of their existing forums/academies/committees. Instead of adding this practice as an extra responsibility to the existing committees, a separate unit has to be formed. You may call it by any name.

This practice is the platform for integrating all the diverse skills and exposures made available to the knowledge society.

The inclusion of the Indian Parliamentary System in the Practice is a major component. All the other skills/information inputs are directed for application of e-governance in a bottom-up model.

Topics and activities must be carefully selected in line with the spirit of Knowledge Society. This 'Best Practice' develops students' skill to think, understand, express, form positive views and be a responsible citizens of the 'Knowledge Society'. The aim at micro level is to promote self-development through self-learning.

E. Post-accreditation Initiatives

Recommendations of Peer Team, Second Cycle

While the College is marching towards the third cycle of assessment, it is necessary to look at the recommendations of the previous Peer Team's observations and the extent to which the progress of the College is in line with those suggestions.

Compliance Report

1. Introduction of courses in Psychology and Social Work

- The College has started Graduation Course in Psychology from the academic year 2012-13. Hitherto Psychology was offered as one of the options to the students of Arts faculty up-to second year of Arts. But, after the recommendation of Peer Team, the College had the written to the University of Mumbai and after observing all the procedures, Psychology was introduced at Third Year Bachelors of Arts. It is an unaided course affiliated to the University of Mumbai. Full-time teachers have been appointed for teaching at third year level.
- A Crash Course of one month duration in Social Service for National Service Scheme (NSS) volunteers is introduced since October 2015.

2. Starting of add-on courses like, Hospital Management, Hotel Management, Travel and Tourism management, Banking and Insurance and Graphics and Animation may be initiated.

- a. Add-on Courses of the University of Mumbai
- Certificate Course in Conversational English was initiated from the academic year 2012-13. Duration of this Course is one year. Till now 24 students have completed the Course
- Certificate Course in Gandhian Philosophy has been started from the academic year 2012-13. Duration of the Course is three months. Till now 11 students have completed the Course

b. Add-on/crash course Courses initiated at the College Level

- Training in software like Tally, Excel, etc.
- Certificate course in '<u>World Tourism Management' in collaboration</u> with Thomas Cook India Ltd. After completing this course students are also offered the placement opportunities by the Thomas Cook India Ltd.
- Vidya Prasarak Mandal, the management of the College, has entered into an agreement with Cambridge University, UK and has introduced Business English Certificate Courses (BEC) from the academic year 2014-15. Preliminary (Level-1), Vantage (Level-2) and Higher (Level-3) are the three levels of these certificates. The College trains students for all these three levels. After completing these courses it is easier for students to get visa for going to UK and other Commonwealth countries for education purpose.

3. Faculty may be provided training programmes for the use of ICT enabled teaching-learning methods

- Many teachers have acquired computer related knowledge or completed MS-CIT. The College library has access to e-databases such as J-STORE, CMIE, Manupatra, EBSCO, etc.
- The College also subscribes to N-list database of UGC.
- These e-sources are very important for teachers while pursuing their research work. Hence, every year the Librarian of our College conducts the orientation sessions for teachers about how to access these sources. When teachers are updated and refer latest and various e-resources, it enriches the ICT enabled teaching.
- Teachers have realised the need of ICT enabled lectures for effective teaching. As a result of it they are using LCD Projectors, to show internet, PowerPoint presentations, YouTube videos and other online sources to students for making teaching more interesting.

4. More faculty members may be encouraged to clear NET/SET examinations.

Majority of teachers have qualified NET or SET examination.

5. More number of research projects may be taken up with the assistance of funding agencies and publication of research articles in refereed journals may be given priority. Research Committee may be formed.

• As per the recommendations of the Peer Team, the College promoted the research activities on a large scale. As a result of it teachers started

taking up the Minor Research projects. In last four years eight teachers applied for the Minor Research Projects funded by the UGC and University of Mumbai. Six teachers got the sanction from the UGC and one teacher got from the University of Mumbai. Seven Minor Research Projects have been completed during the report period.

- As per the recommendation, the Research Committee was formed in the academic year 2011-12 in order to promote and support research. The Research Committee has organised the research related lectures and workshops for teachers.
- Due to the encouragement given by the College five teachers have availed the facility of FDP of UGC for completing Ph.D.
- During last four years seven teachers have completed the Ph.D.
- Dr. (Mrs.) Shakuntala A. Singh, Mr. Narayan Barse, Dr. S. K. Savanur, Mrs. Shraddha Bhome and others have talked/conducted workshops about different aspects of research. The College has a Research Academy for students. The goal of this Academy is to develop research culture and acumen among the students. The students are conducting small research projects under the guidance of teachers.

6. Language Laboratory facility may be extended to all students

- The College runs the Add-on Certificate Course of UGC in Conversational English since 2012-13. These students need to use the Language Laboratory so that they can understand the course content in a better way. All the students who enrol for this course avail the Language Laboratory facility.
- The College has designed 'Functional English' course on its own by taking the help of teachers from the Departments of Economics, Business Law and Geography. Students of this course also make use of Language Laboratory.
- Vidya Prasarak Mandal (VPM), the parent body (The Management), has entered into an agreement with the Language Assessment Department of Cambridge University, UK. As per this agreement the College has started the Business English Certificate (BEC) courses from the academic year 2014-15. The BEC students also utilise the Language Laboratory facility.
- Apart from it the Departments of English and Bachelor of Mass Media (BMM) make use of Language Laboratory as per requirement.

7. Expansion of physical infrastructure by creation of additional space may be taken up.

- As College is located near a creek, there is no Government permission for new construction within the campus. Hence, infrastructure cannot be increased by way of constructing new buildings.
- Nevertheless, the College makes optimum utilisation of existing facilities by planning the activities meticulously and preparing the academic time table carefully. The facilities such as Principal's Conference Room, Kattyayan, the auditorium are also used for lectures and other presentations. The corridor outside the library is also made available for students' study. They are provided with time and space for discussions and preparing PowerPoint Presentations and Projects. Wi-Fi facility is given to the Students and staff enabling them to use their laptops.
- Even, the terrace of Commerce and Arts building is used for various curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities such as *yoga* sessions, lectures, discussions, practice sessions of karate, etc. Wherever possible, the optimum utilisation of space is done and new facilities are provided to students, within the space available. For example, in the library the Braille Section has been created for the visually challenged students.

8. Academic Audits by internal and external experts may be periodically undertaken

The College conducted the External Audit by inviting a senior Principal from the neighbourhood college.

9. The students' feedback mechanism may be further strengthened, analysed and corrective measures taken.

Every year the feedback is taken from the students. Students evaluate the teachers on a ten point scale. These ten questions are about the teaching style-ability, knowledge of the subject, etc. The duly filled-up forms are analysed. The Principal of the College calls the meetings of all the departments separately and discusses the outcome of the feedback and asks the teachers to improve their performance accordingly. From the academic year 2014-15 the students are asked to fill-up the forms on computers.

10. The College could go for autonomous status

The College has informed the VPM (Management) about the process of going in for autonomous status. The management is contemplating with the idea of autonomy.


To sum up, out of ten recommendations made by the Second cycle Peer Team, nine and half have been complied. Even half the suggestion (Seventh recommendation) not accomplished was beyond the control of the College, as it involved entanglement with the Government rules.

Report of the Peer Team on the Institutional Accreditation of the K. G. Joshi College of Arts and N. G. Bedekar College of Commerce, Thane, Maharashtra 2003-04

Section 1: Preface

K. G. Joshi College of Arts and N. G. Bedekar College of Commerce, popularly known by a single name as Thane College of Arts and Commerce, affiliated to the University of Mumbai, was started by the educational society called Vidhya Prasarak Mandal in the year 1969. Besides this college, the Mandal runs a primary school, high school, a polytechnic, a junior college for arts and commerce, a junior college for science, a science college, an institute of management studies, and a law college. Except the primary and the high school the rest of the institutions are in a single campus spread over an area of 10.5 acres of land with several good buildings and a ring route encircling the entire campus. All these institutions have their independent infrastructure except for a common auditorium, canteen and sports ground. In fact this college was earlier a composite college of Arts, Science and Commerce, but later got bifurcated into two colleges viz., Arts and Commerce College; Science College.

The college is situated in the city of Thane is under grant-in-aid and recognized under sections 2(f) of UGC Act in 1979. The college offers B.A., and B.Com., under the grant-in-aid scheme. The college also offers B.Com.(Accountancy and Finance), B.Com.(Banking and Insurance), B.M.S., B.Lib.I.Sc., M.Com. under self-financing scheme. There are 2711

students enrolled for the above courses. There are 33 teachers (28 permanent, 4 temporary, and 1 Part Time) under the grant-in-aid salary scale; 13 Clock Hour Basis (CHB) teachers; and for 5 purely temporary teachers the management pays the salary. Thus, making the total teaching staff to 51. Among the 51 teachers, 5 have Ph.D. degrees and 6 have M.Phil. degrees. Two teachers, one in the Department of Philosophy and the other in History are recognized as research guides by the University. The Department of Philosophy is a recognized research centre of the University of Mumbai. The college has 3 buildings which have adequate lecture halls, seminar room, a common staff room, a separate library, a computer centre, and an administrative office which is shared by the Junior College, and the Senior College.

The college volunteered to be assessed by the National Assessment and Accreditation Council (NAAC), Bangalore and submitted a self-study report. The NAAC appointed the Peer Team consisting of Professor S. D. Tripathi, former Vice Chancellor of Awadesh Pratap Singh University, Rewa, and Rani Durgavati University, Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh as Chairman, Dr. S. Seetharama, former Professor and Director, Documentation Research Training Centre, Indian Statistical Institute, Bangalore, Karnataka, and Dr. Nila Oza, Professor and Head, Department of Economics, Bhavnagar University, Bhavnagar, Gujarat as Members. Mr. B. S. Ponmudiraj, Assistant Advisor to the NAAC coordinated the visit of the peer team.

The team visited the college during December 27th and 28th, 2003 for physical verification of infrastructure and interacted with the members of the Management, Principal, teaching staff, non-teaching staff, representative group of students, alumni, and parents during different sessions. The team went through all relevant documents and verified the

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details. Based on the above exercise and keeping in mind the seven criteria identified by NAAC, the peer team assessed the college and its report as follows.

Section 2: Criterion-wise Analysis

Criterion I: Curricular Aspects

In consonance with the goals and objectives of the institution, viz., to provide facilities for intellectual, physical, scientific, social, cultural and professional education and to emphasise the need for industrial knowledge, the institution is offering B.A./B.Com/B M S /B.Li.Sc. degrees, the last two being self-financing courses. In addition to these undergraduate courses the college is recognized as a centre for post graduation in Commerce. The Faculty of Arts includes Departments in English, Marathi, Hindi, Sanskrit, History, Geography, Politics, Economics, Mathematics & Statistics, Philosophy; the Faculty of Commerce includes Accountancy, Commerce, Business Law; Faculty of Library and Information Science has the Department of Library & Information Science. However, there are no bridge/remedial courses to the educationally disadvantaged to students. The courses offered seem to be in line with societal needs. Keeping in mind the needs of the student community and employment market, B M S and B Lib Sc courses were introduced. Depending on the course, it takes about 3 months to 3 years to commence the programme after it is conceptualised.

The courses are said to provide a healthy blend of knowledge and skills. While the time frame is inflexible, student convenience in regard to working hours, timetable, teaching days, examination, and extracurricular and co-curricular activities has been taken into consideration.

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3 However, they are flexible in relation to horizontal mobility, elective and 7 non core options. 0 0 The Curricula are reviewed and updated by Board of Studies constituted by Mumbai University and Syllabi are revised after 3 to 5 years normally. 0 There is an active involvement of teachers in designing curricula and 2 examination matters. Interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary approach is adopted in curricular design and modular curriculum is conspicuous by its absence. In this context it must be mentioned that the B Lib Sc programme is one of its kind conducted in a college under the jurisdiction of Mumbai University. -Academic audit is done by the university as also by local inquiry committee in relation to BMS and B Lib Sc. The College is yet to obtain D feedback from academic peers and employers regarding curricula. 0 3 Criterion II: Teaching, Learning and Evaluation 0 The admission policies and procedures are objective and transparent and are governed by the rules and regulations laid down by the Maharasthra 3 Government and Mumbai University. It is mandatory to admit all "In-house students" who have successfully passed the HS examination, with 3% reservation for sportspersons, handicapped, wards of ex-servicemen, defense personnel(including widows). All students are admitted by a centralised admission process for BMS. BLiSc admissions are done on first-come-first-serve basis. There is, however, no formal provision for assessing students' knowledge & skills for a programme after admission. Number of teaching days for the last academic year was 185 and working days were 280. There is no formal arrangement to collect student evaluation on their campus experiences. 0 5 An Academic Calendar / Teaching Plan is prepared by respective Board 0 of Studies giving guidelines on number of units to be completed through the terms with provision for periodic review. Lectures constitute the 0 backbone of the teaching process, supplemented by Role-plays, Interview techniques, Field trips, Case studies, Audio-Visual aids, etc. There is, 2 however, no monitoring of overall performance of students except periodic monitoring of attendance! Evaluation methods are adopted as 2 laid down by Mumbai University. 75% of classes by were taught by fulltime faculty. Teacher recruitment is as per guidelines of UGC, University and Maharashtra Government. However, there is freedom for college in relation to temporary / ad hoc appointments. Some of the staff have 23 attended seminars / conferences. Only 2 people have served as Resource 0 Persons. No seminars and conferences have been conducted in the 0 college. Faculty evaluation is done by self-appraisal method as well as by D Annual Confidential Reports. D While it is unfortunate that there are no international and national D linkages for teaching and / or research, it is encouraging to note that the faculty contribute in relation to various curricular & extra-curricular activities as well as Members & Chairpersons of various University Committees relating to examination, BOS, Academic Council, Syllabiframing, Career Advancement Committees, etc. One English teacher has been awarded as an Ideal Teacher in 1995. Criterion III: Research, Consultancy and Extension Research does not seem to be a significant activity in the college as no 5 research projects have been undertaken. However, the college seems to 0 be promoting research culture by providing facilities like study leave for 0 Page 5 of 12 0 1 y As tol.

teachers to complete their M.Phil./ Ph.D. programmes. But, there is no financial support available either to teachers or research students. The college is recognized for Ph.D. study in Philosophy. General research guidance in Philosophy and History is being given to 5 students. A few teachers publish regularly. 6

While consultancy services seem to be conspicuous by their absence, extension activities in relation to Community Development, Adult Education and Literacy, AIDS awareness, Social work, Medical camps, Blood Donation camps, Environment awareness, etc. are there. Encouragement is being given to teachers and students in extension activities and the college plans extension activities with GOs and NGOs and like Rotary Club, Red Cross Society, Blood Banks, Civil hospitals, TMC, etc

The college has a Women's Development Centre established in 2003 and among other things pre-marriage counseling is provided to students.

Criterion IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The college is situated on a plot of land measuring 10.5 acres of Creek land. It has three separate buildings. The Master Plan of the College campus indicates the existing buildings and the projected expansion. Totally, there are 32 classrooms and sufficient place for administrative office. All the classrooms are equipped with standard furniture and fixtures. All the buildings have adequate basic amenities on each floor including drinking water. These buildings are shared by Arts and Commerce College and also by Junior College.

The college library has computers, audio-video cassettes, internet and reprographic facilities. It has a spacious reading room where magazines and news papers are arranged properly. The section of the new arrivals

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0 2 shows latest books. The library has 25,796 text books, 8279 Reference 0 books, 16,952 General reference books, 6 audio cassettes, 2 video 0 cassettes, 300 CD ROMs and 87 magazines. 0 The college has a canteen for the students and it has an auditorium also. 2 The canteen and auditorium are common for all the colleges while Library is common for Junior and Senior College. The management is trying to anticipate requirements for future growth to expand infrastructure facilities. Overall infrastructure facilities, their maintenance and advance planning make the campus beautiful and create an atmosphere conducive to teaching and learning. The college 3 encourages adequate utilization of campus facilities. 0 1 The College is having limited facilities for indoor games like table tennis, 1 chess and carom. Facilities for outdoor games are limited to Kho-Kho and Kabaddi. Participation of students in sports is quite encouraging. 0 The teachers and authorities provide adequate support. D 1 Records of the College show good performance of the students in sports. Sports coaches are engaged on honorarium basis. The College is having a Yoga Centre and the students participate in the activity voluntarily. Criterion V: Student Support and Progression The college has sufficient and well-run support services to ensure the physical and intellectual health of all its constituents. The prospectus gives enough information to the students. It offers counseling and placement services too. The College provides financial assistance to the 0 Page 7 of 12 D -100 NA

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0 students given by the Central and State Government. 127 students got scholarship in the year 2002-2003 amounting to Rs.2,71,873/-. 69 students got freeship amounting Rs.91,898 for the same year. Drop out rate is minimal and the percentage of students appearing in qualifying examination after minimum period of study is good. Students visit the counseling cell, which works one day in a week. Counseling is comprehensive. Placement services are there but it requires more support in terms of information regarding job opportunities and further studies. Staff members are given additional charge of these activities. The College has N.C.C. Units for boys and girls separately. N.C.C. Unit for navy and army are giving training to the willing students. It is common for Arts, Science, Junior and Senior Colleges. Navy wing is only for boys and 50 cadets are enrolled. Army wing has 52 boys and 70 girls. Some of the students participated in National Level camps and have performed well. A unit of civil defence is active in coaching of various methods of self protection and community help at the time of emergency. Nature club activities provide awareness for environment and pollution free living. Students do participate in all such activities. The College has formed alumni association and registered it recently. The various recreational services are available to the students and they are benefited through them. Extra curricular activities in the college support overall personality development of the students. The student's feedback mechanism and the grievance-redressal cell are of recent origin. 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Section 3: Overall Analysis

The college has made considerable progress in meeting the objectives of providing higher education particularly to the rural and underprivileged communities of Thane District. The Peer Team appreciates the efforts made so far by the College in introducing some of the healthy practices indicated above. The team has already given its detailed observations / appreciations in each of the criteria. The team makes the following commendations. 10

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- The College has a dedicated team of the teachers who have been doing their job with remarkable enthusiasm.
- The Library is equipped with modern facilities like internet and online cataloguing etc. It has a spacious reading hall and a good collection of text books and periodicals all of which can be traced using the online computers. The College has installed fiber cables in all of its buildings.
- The committee has noted the achievements and awards won by the students in sports, cultural activities and other extra curricular activities like NSS, NCC, Civil Defence, Women study Centre.
- The Shiv Chhatrapati Award won by the students is a commendable achievement.
- Contribution of some teachers e.g. those from the Department of Philosophy and History in research publications is good. The Department of Management Studies is growing quite rapidly.


